ST MARY OF THE CROSS – MARY MACKILLOP 8 AUGUST 2021

The Mary MacKillop Story

Mary MacKillop – An Australian Like Us



Born in Melbourne on January 15, 1842, of Scottish migrant parents, Mary was the eldest of eight children. Her mother, Flora (McDonald), a strong and courageous woman, had amazing trust in God's Providence.

While in Penola, Mary MacKillop met the Pastor of that vast district, Julian Edmund Tenison Woods (English priest, scholar, and scientist). Vitally interested in education, he opened a school, but four years later he wrote to Mary in Portland, it 'cannot be properly conducted until you come up yourself.' In 1866, therefore, Mary and Lexie set off by coach for Penola to join their other sister, Annie.

On 15 August 1867, Sister Mary MacKillop took both her first Vows as a Religious and the title 'of the Cross': a call to lifetime courage. After the most extraordinary cross, her 1871 excommunication from the Catholic Church, Mary was able to say 'I felt nearer to God than I had ever felt before' and afterwards to her mother she wrote 'My path, dearest Mamma, will yet be that of the Cross.' (1872)

Hearing of the Josephites' good work, Bishop James Quinn invited them to Brisbane. On 8 December 1869 Mary and companions set out from Adelaide, 'begging' for fares from one colony to the next.

From Brisbane, Mary returned to escalating problems in Adelaide where misunderstandings led to suggestions about abandonment of the basic structure of central government. On 22 September 1871, Mary was excommunicated for 'disobedience and rebellion'.

When Mary's excommunication was lifted in February 1872, some Sisters of her disbanded community returned, schools gradually reopened, and in July three set out from Adelaide for Bathurst.

A loving member of her family and compassionate Mother to her Sisters, Mary made good friends from all walks of life. Nearest to her heart, however, were the poor and disadvantaged: 'These are the children I love'. Dogged by sadness and ill health throughout her life, she was sustained by her love of a Provident God.





VAD Legislation – Act Now Before Parliamentary Vote

The Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill 2021 is likely to be voted in Parliament next month. It is a very dangerous Bill which would lead to extra deaths in Queensland every year. Including people who would have wrongfully accessed assisted suicide because of wrong diagnosis, wrong prognosis, coercion, elder abuse, untreated mental anguish, or because they had little or no access to palliative care specialists and felt they had no other choice. Here is advice from Cherish Life QLD on how you can help:

1. Arrange a meeting with your local Member of Parliament (probably the best thing you can do)
2. Engage your local community and church to do the same
3. Write a letter to the editor of a newspaper
4. Write a letter to your MP

Catholic Education Week - Good Answers, Good Questions

Recently, while on retreat with the other seminarians of the Holy Spirit Seminary, I heard something that I remembered at a Lismore retreat, presented by Greg Homeming. He said that what makes Catholics different in their approach to religion is that they are “Not afraid to ask questions.” In my time in Catholic schools, and after it, I was not afraid to ask the burning questions of life and I was surprised by the answers I got.

I attended The Cathedral College in Rockhampton for all five of my high school years. In the last two of these years, I had the opportunity, along with all of the other students in my grade, to study for a Certificate III in Christian Ministry and Theology. In this class I asked a lot of questions of Religion (as one who at the time had little of it) and, to the credit of the teacher of that class, they were answered, with more or less satisfaction, for me.

*My journey back to the Catholic faith, although I wouldn't know this until two years' later, started in that class. By being made to enquire into **truth** itself: whether it can be known, whether it can be agreed upon, or whether it even exists? I carried this question out into the working world but found no answers and likewise for many of the questions I had. Who I am, what should I be doing, whether any of this matters at all?*

I was always an inquisitive kid and held the unambiguous truth in high regard. These two appetites are what pushed me into my religion. I kept asking questions and getting answers, sometimes I liked the answers and sometimes I didn't but what I kept constant was an unwavering sense that the answers were out there, and I could find them if I looked hard enough.

*What I found in the Catholic Church was that it not only welcomed questions but that it was unafraid to answer. Through its intellectual, spiritual, and practical traditions, I found real, satisfactory answers, that, while challenging at times, pointed me to the path of the *Truth, the Way and the Life*, for which I was looking.*

As I see it, the challenge of Catholic schooling is twofold. First, it needs to continue encouraging honest questioning and inquisitiveness of students on the topic of religion and, secondly, in order to make the first possible, it needs to be able to answer these questions satisfactorily and with authority. I think many would be surprised at how good the church is at answering the questions we have about it—you only have to ask.

Congratulations Catholic Education on the celebration of 200 years of Catholic Education in Australia. Thank you to Frs Truc and Yon who hosted Will and I last week on our Seminarian visit to the Central Highlands. Thank you too to the many people who shared their journey with Will and I and gave us a wonderful experience of parish life.
